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#### **COMPUTERS IN LIBRARIES CONFERENCE**

From September 23rd to 26th I was very fortunate to be sent on Duty Travel to the first <u>Canadian Conference on Computers in Libraries</u>, held in Toronto at the Skyline Hotel. It was sponsored by the Meckler Publishing Co. and covered various topics such as: LANs (Local Area Networks), MARC cataloguing, CD-ROM market, on-line searching, ILL between Canada and the US, multimedia collection and numerous workshops on hardware and software.

The format of presentation used for this conference was unfamiliar to me and it took some time to adjust. Preconference workshops were presented on Sunday from 8:00 to 12:00 and 13:30 to 17:00. The next day the schedule was more hectic and required more attention and selection on the part of the participants. The introductory session started at 7:30 a.m. and the timetable was set up for 6 to 8 sessions of 1/2 hour and 1-1/2 hours with 5 minutes in between to make a decision on which room to choose from. This meant that from 8:00 to 9:00 you could be following a talk in room A and at 9:05 you could be following a presentation in room B. If, however, the talk was not what you expected you could go back to room A. This constant change was very difficult and annoying. People were moving in and out and not respecting the others who were trying to listen and follow the session.

The Proceedings that were included inside each participant's Conference Kit did not reflect the workshops presented. Some of the speakers were not even prepared. Much of the equipment used, overhead transparencies, microcomputer displays etc... was not appropriate for a big room presentation. Moreover, the schedule was so tight that question periods were almost non-existent.( but luckily you could speak at coffee break or during lunch.)

The last day was reserved for a guided tour of facilities in Toronto using CD-ROM.

Their exhibits were top notch. They had vendors of software and hardware and demos were available at almost all booths. The part that I really enjoyed was learning the new software available on the market today.

When the microcomputer made its way into libraries, most of us showed an interest in the technology. Eventually we became familiar with most of the software available and purchased the "appropriate" package to answer the needs of our library. Now, five, six, seven years later, we realize that the market has grown and more and more packages are available. The same situation is applicable to hardware. Vendors are numerous. For example, the exhibitors at this Conference were: Brodart, Wilson, Follett

Software, Comstow Information Services, Media Flex, Brant Computer Services, Columbia Computer Services, Winnebago Software Co, International Library Systems Corp, Inlex, General Research corp, M.E. Phipps & Associates, Dynix Automated Llibrary Systems, Comspec Communication, Educational Software Products, Meckler Corp, Suntac Computer, Canebsco, Innovative Interfaces Canada, Britannica Learning Materials, Spires Consortium, Novara Software, Congressional Information Service, Micromedia, Cultural Resources, Utlas, Readex Microprint, Butterworths Canada, Grolier, Geac, Lan Source Technologies, CD Plus, Ontario Library Services Center and Datacon Canada, Holus Systems Solutions/Eloquent System, Avec Technical Services, VTLS and World Book Educational Products.

I took the opportunity to sample some of the software packages and tried to have some of my planning problems solved by one of the systems. I was unsuccessful.

As we often stress when we meet students, networking and making contacts is so important. Conferences are the best way to meet other information specialists and the exchange ideas. I was able to meet old members of the Association such as Samm Brockhurst and Gail Darby, exschool teachers and classmates. There were also exhibitors who attend our OALT/ABO Conference on regular basis. After these three days I came back with ideas for activities in the Branch (i.e. workshops), ideas for the 1993 Ottawa Conference and suggestions on how to improve some of my tasks.

It was an enriching experience and a very profitable three days. I encourage other LT's to attend these conferences including our own Conference. As one speaker said: "We can not just talk about librarians and automation ... we should be refering to the users as information specialists".

#### **ILS WORKSHOP**

On November 14, ORB/SRO sponsored a workshop on ILS Integrated Library System. The speaker was Jocelyne Boutin, Customer Support Representative.

ILS is a complete automation solution for corporate and special libraries. Completely automates cataloguing, circulation control, acquisition of materials and serials functions for your library. It provides sophisticated access to sources of machine-readable cataloguing data. Its modular design allows for phased implementation. The convenient common database is accessible from any module, the integrated operation eliminates redundant data entry.

The following modules are available:

- online inquiry: general authority, title, call number searching, boolean logic;
  - cataloguing: on-line storage of records, authority

control, holdings, security, listings, catalogs and labels:

- MARC record interface: building and maintaining the database, loading MARC records and conversion of MARC records;
- circulation; patron and item identification, checkout, check-in, reserve handling, status inquiry, notices and management reports;
- acquisitions: pre-order searching, claiming, receiving and management reports;
- serials control: serials ordering, invoice processing, journal check-in, claiming, reports and supplier interface.

An introduction and a demo of each module was presented. Jocelyne answered specific questions on how the software can handle various situations/problems.

#### **BIBLIOTRAC**

BiblioTrac is the next generation of library software. BiblioTrac's clear, simple screens are colour coded and feature pull down menus. With one keystroke you chose what you want to do next. You always know exactly where you are in the system - how you got threre and how to get back. A comprehensive manual guides you through every step.

BiblioTrac finds books by any word in the title, the subject or the author's name. If BiblioTrack can't find the word you typed, it looks for words that sound like what you typed. If you typed "Asemof", BiblioTrac finds "Asimov".

BiblioTrac even displays a map of the library with your book's location marked by a flashing "X". And it comes with easy to follow instructions for library users, printed on a durable display posted right at the public terminals.

BiblioTrac runs in English, French and Spanish - with

other languages to come. You select a language by touching a key. Separate terminals can run different languages - at the same time.


At every point, BiblioTrac guards against errors. Is the author of that new book really named "Ilish?" or do you mean "Illich" a name already in the catalogue? BiblioTrac checkes with you before accepting the new spelling.

BiblioTrac includes six modules: cataloguing and card printing, on-line public access, circulation, acquisitions, serials, and a MARC record interface. Your library can buy one module at a time, as your budget permits.

Unlike most other library software BiblioTrac doesn't need expensive networking software. A single computer with several inexpensive terminals does it all. Even for a small library, BiblioTrac offers savings on hardware and network software of \$6,000 to \$10,000.

Because it runs on almost everything from desktop micro-computers to main frames, Bibliotrac can serve any size of library. It can carry your library's records from one computer to another when you upgrade. You won't outgrow it.


#### **NEW SOFTWARE/NOUVEAUX LOGICIELS**

AVAIL Circulation System: AVAIL is a stand alone circulation system for use with an IBM PC/XT or AT or compatible, which allows automated loaning of materials. In addition to recording loan transactions, the program maintains files for patrons and materials, calculates overdues and fines and generates circulation statistics.

EASY PAGES: Pre-Made Design Templates for Ready, Set, Gol: Easy pages for Ready Set Gol 4.5 are prefabricated page designs for journals, newsletters and books. Text from a word processor can be poured into the empty pages. For journals and newsletter coordinated designs for articles regular columns, 'pullquotes', and mastheads are provided. These are five designs for journals/ newsletters and four designs for books. Ready,Set, Gol is not included withthe package it must be purchased separately.

MEMBER TENDER: a software tool designed to manage institutional membership lists. Member Tender allows the user to code names according to category, to organize dues, printout specialized reports or labels and other database functions. Particularly useful for maintaining Friends of the Library Groups and User Groups. Used by the Washington State Library System for organizing its membership data. Requires IBM PC or compatible with hard disk drive.

#### Editorial Note:

Jean Desislets passed away July 4, 1990 at the Elizabeth Bruyere Centre in Ottawa. Jean was born on December 24, 1952 and grew up in Ottawa with her Parents, Kay and Jack and her brother, John.

Her interest in books started early. By High School, she had an extensive personal collection and was a member of the Library Club. In 1972 she entered the Library Technician Program at Algonquin College. Along with her fellow students in 1973, she joined OALT/ABO's newly-formed Ottawa Regional Branch/Section Regional d'Ottawa and remained a member after graduation in 1974.

Always an active volunteer, Jean's many services to others included: helping at Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics and at a variety of Teas and Bazaars, working as a Guider with Girl Guides of Canada, and assisting her neighbourhood Community Recreation Association whenever possible.




